FINE ART GCSE - UNDERSTANDING THE ASSESSMENT OBJECTIVES

The following **assessment objectives** (in bold) are explained in student-friendly language below. It is vital that students develop an understanding of how to fulfil these during the course, as they will be working to do so with greater independence in the examination period of year 11, which accounts for 40% of their final grade.

AO1 (25%)

Develop ideas through investigations, demonstrating critical understanding of sources.

I must make connections in my own work to the work of other artists, using similar methods, techniques or concepts. I must use my own photography and drawings to help me develop my ideas. I must ensure I have explored my ideas thoroughly and clearly. I need to show that I understand the purpose, meaning and context of the artists' work and make visual studies and written analysis of it.

AO2 (25%)

Refine work by exploring ideas, selecting and experimenting with appropriate media, materials, techniques and processes.

Whilst experimenting, I must choose the most suitable media for what I am trying to achieve and explore it carefully. I must analyse my methods and reflect on outcomes, showing that I have improved and developed my skills and ideas along the way.

AO3(25%)

Record ideas, observations and insights relevant to intentions as work progresses.

I must make observations from life that include drawing and photography which connect to my theme. I must also consider the discoveries I have made in my explorations and make notes on how these have helped me move forward with my skills and ideas.

AO4(25%)

Present a personal and meaningful response that realises intentions and demonstrates understanding of visual language.

I must synthesize my ideas together into a final piece of work that presents a personal, mature, well thought out response, clearly linking my ideas and explorations to the work of other artists

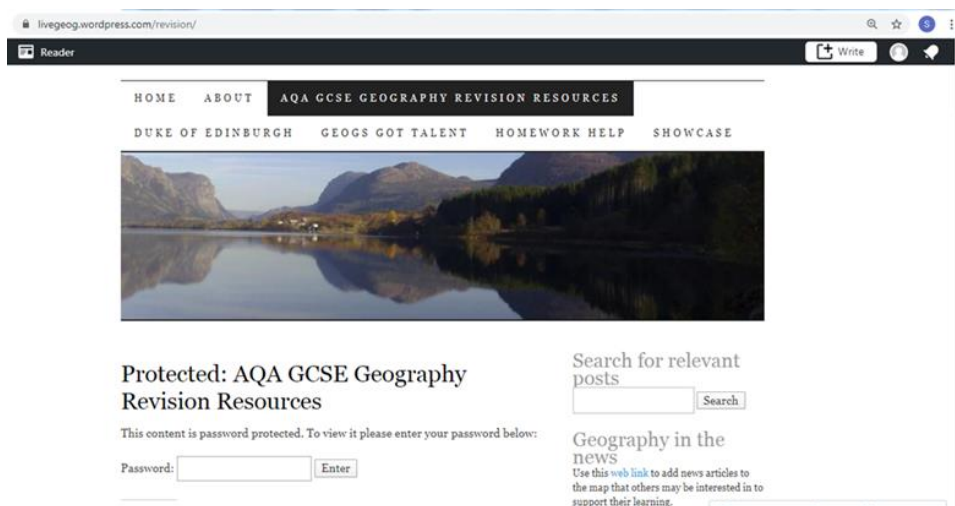

History GCSE

We follow the Edexcel course for GCSE History, with 3 exam papers being sat at the end of year 11 on four key topics.

Unit 1: Migrants to Britain c.800-the present

Unit 2: Superpower relations and the Cold War 1941-91. AND Early Elizabethan England 1558-1588

Unit 3: Weimar and Nazi Germany 1918-39

As a department, we have a proven and effective strategy for success to ensure students achieve the highest grades which they are capable of. Specifically, this revolves around three key areas:

1. **Knowledge Organisers:** Produced by the department, these contain all the key information which students need to know. Students should use these to ensure they have a full understanding of the contextual knowledge in each unit of the exam. Students are routinely exposed to low-stakes knowledge tests in class, and should also do this themselves at home to ensure good understanding of each topic is embedded in their long-term memory.
2. **Cognitive Cue Question Cards:** Written by ourselves, these contain top level model answers to a range of exam questions on every topic. Students should use these to ensure they understand how to answer each type of question, can model what a good answer looks like, and also use them to routinely test themselves.
3. **Exam practice:** Students are routinely and frequently given exam questions and exam papers to consistently practice and refine their knowledge, skills and understanding. Students should make every effort to do this actively as part of their revision.

Our expectation is that students use these high-quality resources to revise independently and effectively outside of school. 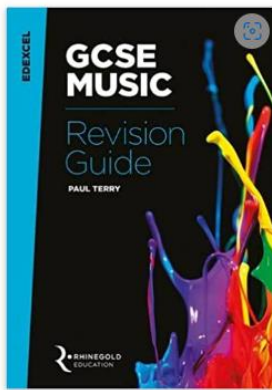

MELODY
Lots of the melody has a **tritone (augmented) movement**, although there are some leaps.
There are **rising sequences** (when a short phrase is repeated going one note higher each time)
There are lots of **scale runs** (notes going up and down a scale)
There are lots of ornaments such as **grace notes (appoggiatura)** and **trills**

RHYTHM, TEMPO and METRE
The metre is 3/8.
The piece uses lots of **triplets** and **dotted rhythms**.
The harpsichord part has lots of **fast semiquaver runs**.
The first melodic line (violin) starts with an **anacrusis**.
Because of the large number of triplets, the piece could also be notated in 6/8 time.
In the Baroque era the dotted quarter semiquaver grouping (like in the first bar) would have been performed in triplet rhythm (with the dotted quarter lasting 2/3 of a beat, and the semiquaver lasting 1/3 of a beat).

HARMONY
The harmony uses **standard chords** of the time.
The music is **diatonic** (all the notes/chords come from the key signature).
Perfect cadences announce the ends of sections, such as the perfect cadence in B minor at the end of the B section.
The harmony uses **standard chords** of the time (mainly chords I, IV and V, with occasional use of ii and vi).
The harmony is **functional** (perfect cadences are used to move between closely related key signatures).
The harmony uses mainly **root position** and **first inversion** chords.
There are occasional **suspensions**.

KEY
3 Grade | 5 Grade | 8 Grade

TONALITY
The main tonality for the piece is **D major**.
The B section is in the relative minor key of **B minor**.
The final A section is back in D major.
The key modulates often to the **dominant** (A major) and the **dominant of the dominant** (E major), indicated by the addition of accidentals.

STRUCTURE
The piece is in **ternary form (ABA)**.
The opening A section begins in a **fugue** style.
The B section is in the relative minor key, and contains a new theme which is similar to the first theme in the A section. There are also fragments of the A section theme in the B section.

DYNAMICS
There are only a few **dynamic markings** on the score, and these are there mostly for balance reasons, like having the violin play quieter so the flute can be heard.

JONORITY/INSTRUMENTS
This piece uses a **solo flute and violin, a harpsichord**, and a **string orchestra** (including violin, viola, cello and double bass).
The group of solo instruments (violin, flute and harpsichord) are known as the **concertino**.
The string orchestra are known as the **ripieno**.
The bass/cello and harpsichord sometimes act as the **basso continuo** in.

TEXTURE
The texture is **polyphonic** (more than one melody happening at the same time).
There is use of **imitation** (when one part imitates another in a call and response style).
The movement begins in a **fugue** style. A fugue is a complicated piece which uses lots of imitation throughout. This movement is not an actual fugue, but it uses **fugue techniques**, like the start of the opening A section.
Sometimes the solo flute and violin play the same thing in **unison**.
When the flute and violin come in at the start, they are

TEXTILES GCSE - UNDERSTANDING THE ASSESSMENT OBJECTIVES

The following **assessment objectives** (in bold) are explained below. It is vital that students develop an understanding of how to fulfil these during the course, as they will be working to do so with greater independence in the examination period of year 11, which accounts for 40% of their final grade.

AO1 Critical Understanding (25%)

Develop ideas through investigations, demonstrating critical understanding of sources.

- You will develop ideas by investigating historical and modern textile designers and artists. You should look at the context and culture in which pieces are created.
- You will explore a wide variety of work produced by textile designers and try to understand their style and the techniques they use. You will create your own transcriptions (versions/copies) of their work.
- You will analyse the work of designers, trying to understand what they are trying to achieve and why. You will think about how studying each designer helps you to develop your own ideas. You will create your own work using their influence to help you.

AO2 Creative Making (25%)

Refine work by exploring ideas, selecting and experimenting with appropriate media, materials, techniques and processes.

- You will explore ideas, experimenting with appropriate textile design techniques and processes.
- You will skilfully use these different techniques and materials to produce quality outcomes.
- You will use lots of different resources to develop exciting ideas.
- You will also use drawing to explore and communicate ideas.
- You should show that you can look at lots of different textile design in depth.
- You should review and be critical of your work as it develops.
- You should show that the techniques you use relate to the outcomes you produce.

AO3 Reflective Recording (25%)

Record ideas, observations and insights relevant to intentions as work progresses.

- Gather, select, organise and communicate information that is relevant to your project.
- Take good quality photographs from a range of relevant sources to influence and inspire your studies.
- Record ideas, first-hand observations, insights and judgments.
- Critically reflect on your work as it progresses in order to review what you have learnt.

AO4 Personal Presentation (25%)

Present a personal and meaningful response that realises intentions and demonstrates understanding of visual language.

- Present personal, imaginative final pieces of work, together with selective evidence of thinking and production processes.
- The connections between all of your pieces of work, from research to final outcome should be obvious. There should be a clear story to follow.

Creative Media BTEC Tech Award

The BTEC Media Tech awards are delivered by EDEXCEL (see link below). The course is split into three components. Components 1 and 2 are to be completed as coursework and component 3 is a film-based exam unit.
